As the executive director of Epicurean Charitable Foundation of Las Vegas, I am honored to work with 25 of the most respected hospitality and food-and-beverage leaders in the industry who make up the ECF board. These dedicated men and women find time in their overwhelming schedules to support the foundation's charitable mission and serve as mentors for our city's future industry leaders.

ECF was founded in 2001 with the primary charitable endeavor of ensuring college scholarships to financially in-need Clark County high school seniors seeking careers in hospitality and the culinary

arts. Scholarship recipients are awarded as much as \$33,000 if attending UNLV and as much as \$48,000 if choosing to pursue a related degree at another institute of higher learning.

ECF stands out not only by awarding scholarships, but also by providing each recipient with a mentor from the ECF board for the duration of his or her education. As part of the Future Leaders of Hospitality Program, the mentors provide students with academic assistance, personal guidance and professional experience unmatched among their peers.

I have seen firsthand the effect that ECF has on

local students. Our scholarship recipients are from a variety of backgrounds — from being temporarily homeless to having to care for two siblings at the age of 14 — but all share one thing in common: They are passionate about a career in hospitality but lack the financial means to do so on their own. ECF opens the door to possibility and provides invaluable guidance along the way.

To support the foundation, we host an annual dine-around event known as MENUS (Mentoring & Educating Nevada's Upcoming Students). We have worked tirelessly since the last event to secure the best venue, entertainment and dining experiences available and are very excited to announce this year's festivities.

MENUS 2014 will be held Friday, Oct. 17, at MGM Grand and feature an exclusive poolside dinearound followed by admission to a concert by three-time Grammy Award-winning country sensation Zac Brown Band at MGM Grand Garden Arena.
